General Panel Structure

For MMLA's 2024 Convention, panels with four presenters have been scheduled for hour-and-a-half sessions, which allots each panelist up to fifteen minutes to present their work before a thirty-minute, collective Q&A. Panels with three or two presenters are scheduled for hour-and-fifteen-minute sessions, providing each panelist fifteen minutes (or, in the case of the latter, twenty minutes) to present their work before the collective Q&A portion.

Presenters will discuss their own experience and what they have found particularly helpful along the way. Sessions are usually an hour and fifteen minutes long, permitting each presenter to speak before addressing questions from the audience for the remainder of the time.



While we sometimes worry that AI could squelch students' willingness to write, we reject the premise that the humanities' decline will be written by AI.
